You take them, thinking what a great help that is. VIOLATION: Possessing exam materials is against the code of conduct.

Bike Theft Prevention 101

Penn State has seen an increase in the number of bicycle thefts from campus. Here are some things you can do to protect your bike.

Buy a U-lock. They are harder to cut through.

Put your lock through your back wheel and the frame. Because most bikes have quick release wheels, locking just a wheel is not very secure because somebody could just take the wheel off and walk away with the rest of your bike. Locking the wheel AND the frame makes it harder to do this.

Lock your bike to something secure. You don't want something that is movable or breakable. Be sure no one can just lift your bike, lock and all, over whatever you've locked it to. You want to put your lock THROUGH something, not just around it.

photos of your bike and the serial number written down somewhere. If your bike is stolen, this information can help you get your bike back. You can find your bike's serial number on the bottom bracket, which is the part where the axle for the pedals goes through.

Register your bicycle. Penn State has an on-line bicycle registration where you can register your bicycle for 2 years, free of charge. www.transporation.psu.edu

There are some other things to think about. You can use a chain lock in addition to your U-lock. Having two different kinds of locks makes it harder to steal, because it takes longer to cut both of them. Be aware of other removable things on your bike that can be stolen. Like your
